## **CHAPTER SUSPENSION**

Effective January 4<sup>th</sup>, 2023, the undergraduate organization of the Oklahoma Chapter of Triangle has been suspended for a period of 4 years.

The National Council took this action following several semesters of poor performance, including sub-standard GPA, a failure to fill available beds in the Chapter house, and other symptoms that indicate a “chapter culture that must be corrected.” The Chapter’s charter remains in the hands of our alumni organization, and all undergraduate members as of January 4<sup>th</sup> have been moved to alumni status.

Over the past several months, the Board of Directors and many interested members of our alumni organization have begun work on a plan to prepare the Chapter for a return to campus. As part of this, we are hoping to increase alumni involvement in all areas. If you’re not currently involved, we encourage you to keep reading to learn more about upcoming events that may interest you, and we encourage you to attend some of the Board of Directors meetings over the next couple months. Advice and thoughts from our alumni are always welcome.

## **THE MANOR**

Triangle Building & Housing Corporation has arranged for a new tenant to take possession of Kirkpatrick Manor during our absence.

Thanks to the assistance of Br. Bluemlein (191ok) we were able to conduct a house inventory, and remove Chapter property during early May. The majority of items have gone to a storage unit procured by the Chapter, while several critical items

are being stored with Br. Slater (194ok12). If you had property in the Manor that you believe may have been swallowed up in the move-out, please don't hesitate to reach out via email or in-person at one of our meetings.

The new tenant, Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity, took possession of the property on July 1<sup>st</sup>, for a period of 2 years with options for 2 1-year extensions. Our remaining financial responsibility for the property has been alleviated.

I continue to remain engaged with social/professional Networking groups, like “Techlahoma”, “Network After Work”, the “Smithsonian Institute” and various Software Engineering groups like MS Tech News, .NET Foundation, CODE Magazine, ClearMeasure, etc, as well as Triangle’s own resources they provide for Alumni: Scobie Leadership School, National Convention, and events organized through CEL (the Council of Emerging Leaders). I also try to remain engaged with the University, our Alumni Association and Foundation, as well as Felgar Society and the College of Engineering, and the Jerry Holmes Leadership Program, and the Computer Science Advisory Board. When there are events I’m aware of on campus, I try to promote them to the members as opportunities for engagement and personal growth, as well as for broadening personal horizons, and developing skills and experience in mentoring and advising undergraduates and young Alumni. If there are any groups, resources, or events you’re aware of that would fall along these lines, please share them with me, and please give feedback on any you’ve participated in. Even as Alumni, there’s still GREAT potential for us all to gain from each other and continue to develop personally and professionally. We’re all life-long members, and our engagement and benefit need not cease at graduation.

## **ALUMNI COMMUNICATION**

As we’ve worked to update the Chapter on recent events, there have been a number of complaints regarding the quality of communication between the different elements of the Chapter. Many of our alumni felt that communications from both the active organization and the Board of Directors were quite lacking, if they were sent at all. The Publicity Committee has taken many of these complaints to heart, and we are actively working to revamp much of the Chapter’s communications. Several technical issues with the mailing lists have been resolved, greatly increasing the reliability of message delivery. We have also entered into a contract for a major redesign of the Chapter’s website and a revamping of our information management systems.

We hope to continue improving the quality (and frequency) of the Chapter’s communications to you. Shortly following the publication of this newsletter via email, it will be duplicated to our website and sent out to our social media pages. Your feedback on this method of communication is greatly appreciated.

## **FINANCES**

The finance committee is responsible for ensuring the long term financial stability of the chapter. To do so, we have been focusing on ensuring that various sources of need are met with the best source of funds possible. In the past, we have accomplished this task by splitting expenses between both the alumni and active org, though without an active chapter, clearly our financial needs have evolved, and therefore, so has our strategy. We have now categorized major initiatives into three separate categories:

1. Operate efficiently “in the now” by focusing on programs our alumni actively want.
2. Gather financial resources for undergraduate recolonization. This will include advertising on campus, scholarships, and incentives to recruit a top quality undergraduate class.

3. Plant the seeds for our long term success, by establishing funds which outlast any one board, term, or fraternity member.

To make Triangle work, we need all three legs of this strategy to be viable. We feel these values have been reflected in our annual budget which we passed this year, and look forward to sharing more specific details with you on our website which we are in the middle of renovating.

For the first leg, expect to see more communications, and more events (both locally and in regions we have alumni). For the second leg, we have reallocated prior active funds for this purpose, and set aside 'savings' for the next generation. We anticipate part of our annual scholarship fund to be used for this purpose once recolonization begins in earnest. With these objectives met, and our new Permanent Fund rounding out the third leg, Triangle will have the foundation needed to grow and thrive, but to make them, we need *your help!*
